N. B. Beets, Carrots, and Onions should have a 2" stem.

Garlic should have a 3" stem.

Cut Flowers, Potted Plants and Arrangements

Rules and Regulations:

All plants and flowers must be home grown.

Flowers and foliage used in arrangements must be fresh not artificial.

Please, do not use flexible or valuable containers and ensure containers are sufficient to offset heavy blooms.

Definitions:

Branch	- An appendage that appears off the side of the main stalk or stem
Miniature	- A plant which is, by nature or cultivation, a miniature and not just an immature size of a normal plant
Spike	- An upright stem carrying several flowers which are nearly stemless, e.g. Gladiolus, Liatris
Stalk	- The stem or main axis of a plant; any supporting or connecting part of a plant
Stem	- A main plant structure that supports flowers, leaves, buds or fruit (see stalk)
NIP	- Named if Possible

Section J – Culinary Division

Rules and Regulations:

For cakes and pies, pan size is optional.

If you use smaller pans, we are asking you to leave the whole entry, making a much nicer display in the showcase.

If you are entering the 1/2 loaf/cake, we will retain 1/2 of your entry for display. **There will be a few exceptions.**

1. Small pies will be accepted.
2. All pies to be shown in a pie plate.
3. Tarts to be regular size.
4. Baking should be shown in zip lock bags or similar plastic bags and closed. Secure tag to outside of plastic bag, preferably stapled, do not use tape.
5. Remove all cakes, breads etc. from pans. All baking should be displayed on a foil-covered base, or suitable plate, unless other directions are given.
6. Muffins and cupcakes may be made using paper liners, **liners must be removed** to exhibit.
7. No commercially prepared mixes or pie/tart shells.
8. For information on the OAAS Classes go to the OAAS website, Home Page, scroll to the bottom to Information on Provincial Competitions, Click the link for Convention, then click on District and Provincial Competition Rules.
9. Rolled - means rolled flat with a rolling pin, then cut out.
10. Squares – 2"x 2" (5cm) square - no outside edges.
11. Bars - 1 ½" x 2" (3.75 cm x 5cm) - no outside edges.
12. Junior Baking: Please fill in entry tax with the child's name and address only, do not include parent's membership number

BUTTERMILK, BRAN AND BLUEBERRY MUFFINS

3 cups natural bran	2 eggs, beaten
2 cups whole wheat flour	2 cups buttermilk
½ cup granulated sugar	1/3 cup vegetable oil
1 tablespoon baking powder	½ cup molasses
1 teaspoon baking soda	1 cup blueberries (fresh or frozen)

Mix together bran, flour, sugar, baking powder and baking soda. In another bowl combine eggs, buttermilk, oil and molasses; pour into bran mixture and stir enough to moisten, being careful not to over mix. Fold in blueberries. Spoon into non-stick muffin tins, filling almost to the top.

Bake at 375° F for about 25 minutes or until firm to touch. Remove from oven and let stand for 2 minutes before removing muffins from tin.

- * Entry must be solely made and hand quilted by the exhibitor and judged at a local fair.
- * Entry quilts must be **a minimum of 280" measured on the perimeter**. **Note** the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.
- * The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame.
- * The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.
- * The winner's name and pattern to be displayed at the Fair on signs provided by OAAS.
- * Grand Champion Quilt will go to the District level for judging.

Items in the Homecraft Division should not be shown more than twice.

Must be new and clean. Old or soiled items will not be judged.

A sample of material must be attached to all articles of sewing and yarn = SMA or YSA (Yarn)
